

## LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

## For the next generation.

From the very first conservation easements we closed in 2007, preserving the heritage of land that supports wildlife, agriculture, and Texan families has been our number one goal.

Legendary West Texas ranchers Claytie and Modesta Williams were intrigued with the concept of a land trust created by landowners for landowners. As they pondered their estate planning and how to pass their life's work down to the next generation, they wanted to be sure the land they fiercely loved would be protected forever.

That's how Happy Cove Ranch and High Lonesome Ranch became the first two easements closed by the new land trust on the Texas range, the Texas Agricultural Land Trust (TALT). Those first two easements protected more than 70,000 acres of working lands, and immediately put TALT on the map as the largest state-based land trust in Texas.

Claytie and Modesta's reputation also helped dispel some of the misperceptions about conservation easements, opening the door for other Texas landowners to consider whether a conservation easement could be a tool that would work for them.

We've come a long way since 2007, when TALT was formed by the leadership of the Texas Wildlife Association, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and the Texas Farm Bureau. Since then, we've worked with landowners across the state and have partnered with over 30 families, forever protecting more than 236,000 acres.

Today we are exploring new tools that will support the next generation of stewards who will inherit these incredible family legacies. These tools aim to meet the needs of the next generation of land stewards like Jeff Williams and Chim Wellborn who are stepping up to care for their parents' beloved Happy Cove and High Lonesome ranches.

Thank you to our generous donors, exceptional board, dedicated staff, and landowner partners who believe in our work. We are honored to serve the next generation of land stewards, and remain committed to keeping Texas big, wide and open.

# TALT STRATEGIC PLAN

Keeping Texas big, wide and open is the end game of the work we do every day. In 2021, TALT engaged its Board of Directors and Advisory Board to develop a new strategic plan to guide our work going forward. Four key guideposts emerged as our organization's focus.

## PROTECTING WORKING **LANDS**

Providing flexible tools to protect working lands and being a trusted source of information is the foundation of our efforts. In addition to conservation easements, we are helping to connect landowners to new innovations such as ecosystem services markets that will help landowners capitalize on the carbon, water and biodiversity resources that are part of their land heritage.

# **BUILDING COLLABORATIVE PARTNERSHIPS**

Partnerships built on mutual respect are critical to our success. From forging relationships with the state and federal conservation programs that support landowners, to the non-governmental organizations that advance private land conservation, to financial and estate planning industries, we build partnerships that ensure working lands stay working.







## **ADVOCATING FOR LANDOWNERS**

We are a voice for Texas landowners in Austin and in DC. We played an instrumental role in urging the creation and funding of the Texas Farm and Ranch Lands Conservation Program and championing Farm Bill programs like the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program. Today we continue our advocacy to bolster these voluntary programs that benefit private landowners and our open spaces.

# PROTECTING TEXAS WORKING LANDS PROTECTS

TEXAS WILDLIFE



According to the American Farmland Trust, Texas' agricultural working land is the most threatened in the nation, having lost 1.3 million acres between 2001 and 2016. This development and fragmentation destroy critical habitat for many plants and animals. Fortunately, TALT has more than 236,000 acres of conserved working lands that protect a diverse range of habitats that support hundreds of plant and animal species.



# Passing on a Family Land Legacy to the Next Generation



"For me, Happy Cove is a slice of heaven and it has raised our families," said Chim Wellborn, Claytie and Modesta's youngest daughter. "I could not imagine ever splitting it up."

Fortunately, for Chim and Jeff and the extended Williams family, the land will always remain whole. As part of their estate planning, Claytie and Modesta placed a conservation easement on portions of both ranches in 2007, forever protecting their family legacy.


Jeff will be the next generation of the Williams family to steward the High Lonesome Ranch, and Chim will be keeping a watchful eye over Happy Cove. Jeff and Chim take their role as next generation land stewards very seriously.

"There's something in the land out here that just gets inside you and it's impossible to get out," said Jeff. "Keeping it whole and in its natural state is really important to me."

"Mom and Dad put so much work into these ranches, and it was absolutely a passion for them," agreed Chim. "They had incredible foresight to explore a conservation easement. Now it is our responsibility to take care of this land for the rest of our lives."









# **Conservation Easements Closed in FYE 2021**



Former Texas Speaker of the House **Gib Lewis** donated an easement on his 1,000-acre SO3 Ranch in Burnet County. The easement protects a tributary of the Brazos River and includes native prairie and open space which provides habitat for myriad species of wildlife.



Perry Donop Jr. donated an easement on the Donop Llano River Ranch in Mason County, forever protecting 423 acres, including river frontage. It provides habitat for a variety of species from white-tailed deer to songbirds, waterfowl and upland game birds.



Myrna and David K. Langford and their family donated an easement on Laurels Ranch in Kendall County, one of the fastest growing areas in the country. The easement protects 298 acres and is home to numerous wildlife species and a creek and springs that feed the Guadalupe River.



Thanks to funding from the Texas Farm and Ranchland Conservation Program, the Jacob and Terese Hershey Foundation and the Texas Land Trust Council, **Sky Lewey** closed on an easement on her family's Open V Ranch. The ranch sits on more than 200 acres along the Nueces River and Bird Springs Creek in Uvalde County and is part of the Edwards Aquifer Recharge Zone.



Teresa Ohlrich Johnson and her husband Rob Johnson donated an easement on 123 acres of their JO Ranch in Comal County, forever protecting the land. Were the JO Ranch to be sold and developed, more than 600 homes could be accommodated. Now, because of the easement, that will never happen.



# Steve and Susan Lewis Give Back to Texas

Carrying on a legacy is a Lewis family tradition. Steve C. Lewis' family has been at the helm of Jefferson Bank in San Antonio for nearly 75 years. The family has a similar legacy in land stewardship, operating ranches in Kendall, Medina and Schleicher counties.

About 15 years ago, a family friend approached him to help get a new agricultural land trust off the ground. Blair Fitzsimons convinced Steve to sign on, and he became TALT's founding board chair.

"The notion that my great-grandchildren will be able to see a wide-open Texas is important to me," said Steve, who also owns a ranch real estate company. "As a ranch broker, I've seen many tracts of land broken up. Landowners have the right to sell, and no one can blame them. But I decided I wanted to volunteer for the folks who want to keep as much of it whole as possible."

"It was an easy decision for Susan and I to include a gift to the Forever Texas Fund in our last will and testament," said Steve. "We hope other Texas landowners will follow suit."



"It means so much to us that the wide-open spaces of Texas will be conserved for future generations," agreed Susan. "Not just for our grandchildren and great-grandchildren, but for all Texans."
